Internal Advocacy: Prove the Power of Your After-School Program

• When advocating for your after-school program to school administrators and staff, focus on showcasing how the program directly enhances students' academic performance, social skills, and overall well-being. Present data and testimonials that illustrate improvements in grades, attendance, and behavior among participants. Emphasize the program's role in providing a safe and supportive environment that complements the school's educational objectives. By clearly linking the benefits of your program to the school's mission and goals, you can demonstrate its indispensable value and garner stronger support from key stakeholders.

National News & Legislative Updates:

- The House Appropriations Committee approved the Fiscal Year (FY) 2025
 Labor-HHS-Education bill with an 11%-16% cut from FY 2024 levels, despite a
 \$2 billion boost. This could reduce funding for education, health, and social
 services, impacting children and families who rely on these programs. Ongoing
 partisan disagreements and a tight schedule add uncertainty to the bill's future.
- House Agriculture Chairman G.T. Thompson's farm bill, which advanced out of committee with a bipartisan vote, faces an uncertain future due to partisan disagreements over nutrition and climate policies. The bill includes nearly \$30 billion in cuts over 10 years, raising concerns about its impact on the 41.4 million people relying on SNAP. For kids and families, this could mean reduced access to essential food assistance, affecting their health and well-being.
- The Child Care for American Families Act, introduced by Congressman
 Kustoff, aims to expand childcare access by increasing the Employer-Provided
 Childcare Tax Credit, particularly benefiting small businesses and rural areas.
 The bill encourages multiple employers to apply jointly and directs the IRS to
 promote the credit. This legislation seeks to make childcare more affordable
