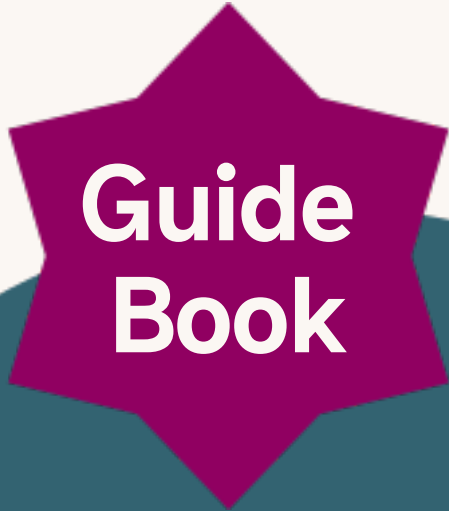

Grant Requirement

21st Century Community Learning Center programs are required to employ a dedicated program coordinator for a minimum of 20 hours per week if overseeing one site and 40 hours per week if overseeing multiple sites.

Grant Requirements

21st Century CLC programs are required to meet a minimum of 10 hours per week and 115 days per year. Summer programming and days set aside for program staff training or program planning do not count toward this total.

Programs must offer adult family members of 21st CCLC participants opportunities for active and meaningful engagement in their children's education, including opportunities for literacy and related educational development. Programs must offer at least four family engagement events per school year.

21st Century Community Learning Centers are required to regularly provide all participants academic enrichment programming that goes beyond remedial education, tutoring services, or homework help.

Grant Requirements

Transportation between school, center, and home cannot be a barrier for any student attending the 21st CCLC. Applicants must describe how they will meet the potential transportation needs for participants, ensuring that transportation to and from the program will not interfere with their ability to participate

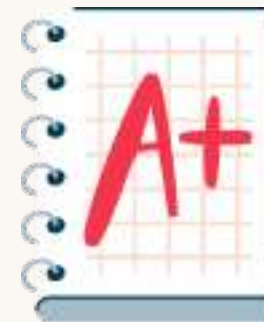
Getting There is Half the Battle

Grant Requirement

WI 21st CCLC grantees are required to participate in a self-assessment process during the five-year cycle of funding. This process is intended to be an opportunity for site program staff to reflect on what they do well and what they can improve to best meet the needs of the students and families served by the program.
